Commencing Tuesday, Nov. 29, 1910, patrolmen and patrol wagon drivers under the age of 45 years will be assigned to gymnasium classes, according to their respective ages. Non-commissioned officers, not over 45 years of age will be assigned to various classes as file closers.

Each class will exercise on the day designated in the following schedule:

Class A — Ages 38 to 44 years — Tuesday — Non-commissioned officers: Sergeants 4th and 8th districts, and Corporals 9th district.

Class B — Ages 34 to 37 years — Wednesday — Non-commissioned officers: Sergeants 3rd and 10th districts, and Corporals 10th district.

Class C — Ages 29 to 33 years — Thursday — Non-commissioned officers: Sergeants 2nd and 9th districts, and Corporals 6th district.

Class D — Ages 21 to 28 years — Friday — Non-commissioned officers: Sergeants 1st and 5th districts, and Corporals 8th district.

Each of the above classes will be subdivided into three sections, each section representing a relief, and will exercise as follows: First Relief at 4 p. m.; Second Relief at 10 a. m., and the Third Relief at 8:30 a. m. Substitutes will report at the Gymnasium at 1:30 p. m. on Tuesday.

This order supersedes all other orders pertaining to Gymnasium classes.

To all Members of the Police Department:

WHEREAS, John R. Holmes, former Director of Public Safety of the City of Cincinnati, granted permission to the patrolmen to organize a Policemen's or Patrolman's Welfare Association, the object and purpose of which were to promote social intercourse and to bring about a better understanding between the patrolmen and their officers; and

WHEREAS, The activities of said association have been such as to be a detriment to the department, and that instead of promoting the welfare of the department and the interests of the city, said association has continuously sought to undermine the discipline of said department, and to obtain complete control of the affairs of the police department in its own hands instead of that of the constituted authorities; and

WHEREAS, The object and purpose of the Policemen's or Patrolman's Welfare Association of Cincinnati are such as to directly and indirectly seek to interfere with the discipline and conduct of the members of the police department and to interfere with the exclusive control of the police department by the Director of Public Safety.

Now, therefore, it is ordered and decreed that any member of the department who is a member of the Policemen's or Patrolman's Welfare Association of Cincinnati on and after November 15, 1920, shall be deemed guilty of violating Bulletin Order No. 3540, dated November 21, 1917, reading as follows:

"The following rule has been enacted by the Director of Public Safety, effective at once:

"No member of the Police Department may join or be a member of any organization or society, the object or purpose of which shall either directly or indirectly seek to interfere with the discipline and conduct of the members of the department and the exclusive control of the Police Department by the Director of Public Safety. A violation of this rule shall be cause for dismissal from the department."

Commanding officers will see that this rule is rigidly enforced, and any violation of the same coming to their knowledge will be reported at once to the Chief of Police.
