OFFICER

Walter was born February 1, 1927 in Hamilton County to Howard (of Illinois) and Pearl (Sinclair) (of Kentucky) Williams. He served in the United States Army Air Force during the second world war and was honorably discharged as a corporal on December 1, 1948.

When he came home, he moved into 1723 Central Avenue.

Walter joined the Cincinnati Police Division as a Police Recruit on July 1, 1950. He was promoted to Patrolman on

September 1, 1950, issued Badge 455, and assigned to District 7 (813 Beecher Street).

INCIDENT

On October 17, 1951, at 2:30 a.m., Patrolman Williams was operating a 1950 Chevrolet Coupe west on Laidlaw Avenue. Victor Heinrick (28) of 114 South Main Street in Sharonville drove a 1951 Ford sedan northbound on Paddock Road. The two collided at the intersection.

Heinrick was dead at the scene.

Patrolman Williams suffered a skull fracture and broken neck. Patrolman Miley, Highway Safety Bureau, transported him to General Hospital.

DEATH

At 3 a.m., Doctor Keerle pronounced Patrolman Williams's death from multiple body injuries and traumatic shock.

Patrolman Williams was survived by his mother, Pearl Williams. He was buried in Section 22, Grave 2321, Vine Street Cemetery on October 20, 1951.

EPILOGUE

During 1995, the Cincinnati Police Planning Section discovered Cincinnati Municipal Code Section 306-40 directing that "the badge and badge number of any police officer who is killed in the line of duty or active military duty shall be retired from use by the Cincinnati Police Division." Cincinnati Police Chief Michael C. Snowden determined to surrender badges going back to 1950, including those currently issued to police

officers on a voluntary basis. Police Officer Bonnie Kreimer was assigned Patrolman Williams's badge number. She voluntarily surrendered her badge and the Police Division retired No. 455.
