Honoring the past, serving the future

For those who might be new to the GCPHS and wondering how we accomplish our mission, the following information supplied by Historian Ed Zieverink is enlightening and encouraging.

No one would argue the importance of preserving a record of police history, particularly concerning law enforcement personnel who lost their lives in the line of duty. Yet many brave police men and women have been interred with scant records of their burials. That robs society of the chance to properly honor them and more important, prevents future family members from marking those locations for posterity. That's why one of our core duties is to identify and mark grave sites of law enforcement personnel. Here is a brief progress report on this effort:

- **Railroad Detective Cleveland Kemp** - He is buried in Johnsville Cemetery, in Johnsville, in Bracken County, Kentucky. His grave site does not have a headstone.
- While doing research on two Cincinnati line of duty deaths, we discovered that Vine Street Hill Cemetery has a monument dedicated to police officers and firefighters who were killed in the line of duty and buried there. The brass plates with the names of the fallen officers and firefighters were stolen from the

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monument and the cemetery did not have any documentation in their files to identify the names. We worked with the cemetery and the fire museum to identify those names and the cemetery has restored the monument. An official dedication is being planned for November.

- Identified two CPD officers who were killed in the line of duty and buried at Vine Street Hill Cemetery without headstones. GCPHS purchased two headstones and had them engraved. They have since been installed and are awaiting the November dedication.
